Pre-Conference Seminar — Digital Sex Ed: Talking Tech, Teens, & Sex

Dr. Alex Rodrigues

As a result of greater access to the Internet and its ever-expanding resources, individuals, especially adolescents, are at risk of being exposed to inaccurate, and in some cases, dangerous sexual content. The proposed presentation will provide those interacting with adolescents with a helpful framework for addressing the intersection of technology and sexuality with youth. For instance, attendees will learn about the potential risk and benefits that the Internet offers regarding sexual education, why adolescents' development and neurobiology places them at greater risk of unsafe online behavior, key resources that can help frame the issue for adults, and emerging interventions designed to address such issues with teenagers and help facilitate their growth as responsible digital citizens.

The learning goals for this session include:

1. Learn about some of the risky sexual digital content that adolescents are routinely confronted with.
2. Understand what constitutes technology facilitated sexual abuse.
3. How such content can affect adolescents' sexual understanding.
4. Identify ways adolescents use the Internet and related technology to enhance their sexual education.
5. Identify key areas to assess to determine whether a youth's digital sexual behavior is negatively affecting his or her life.
6. How to engage adolescents in a collaborative approach when discussing technology, teenagers, and sex.

Keynote — From Participant to Practitioner: A Restorative Justice Journey

Dr. Alissa Ackerman

As a survivor of sexual violence, I remained silent for 15 years. This was despite the fact – or perhaps because of the fact – that I worked in a field of sex crimes experts and treatment providers. In 2014, I went public about being a rape survivor. This ultimately became my restorative justice journey from participant to practitioner.

In this 90-minute keynote presentation, I will talk about my experience as a survivor of sexual violence and the process by which I came to participate in vicarious restorative justice. I will then detail how I developed my restorative justice practice and the creation of my organization, Ampersands Restorative Justice. I will discuss the nuts and bolts of restorative justice, including the values inherent in the process, the different types of processes, and how the process aids in both healing for those who experience sexual harm and accountability for those who have authored it.

T1 Effective Collaboration with Schools for Safety Planning

Rich Robison

This presentation will provide practical advice to enhance multidisciplinary partnerships for the purpose of implementing school safety plans for juveniles with sexual misconduct issues. Systematic and thoughtful consideration of supervision and support needs for adolescence with sexual misconduct issues facilitates student access to education and enrichment activities, bolsters student achievement (academically and socially), assists in limiting liability, and more importantly, keeps school communities safe.

T2 The CLiF Project – Current Issues in Representing Former Juveniles

Jon Stride and Sadie Concepción

The CLiF Project's work continues! Since 2010, The CLiF Project has helped people who are on Oregon's sex offender registry for offenses that they committed while children receive relief from registration. The CLiF Project typically represents adults whose treatment and supervision occurred many years ago. By obtaining relief for these adults, we change lives, allowing these adults to recapture the lives they want to lead. Jon Stride and Sadie Concepción, both of whom are experienced attorneys with The CLiF Project, will update the audience about the Project's work, and will address:

The continuing burdens on people placed on the registry for offenses they committed while they were children; the universe of clients The CLiF Project represents; the CLiF Project's procedures for preparing cases, including reliance on reports and recommendations made by professionals involved in the juvenile's treatment and supervision; the current research on recidivism for juveniles who commit sexual offenses, and how The CLiF Project lawyers use this information in presenting its cases; the impact of subsequent negative conduct unrelated to sexual offending and recidivism in relief hearings, including a discussion of the recent ALM decision from the Oregon Court of Appeals; and how (and when) to refer cases to The CLiF Project.

T3 Interpersonal Reconstructive Therapy: interpersonal interviewing and a treatment approach for non-responders *Part 1 of 3*

Dr. Wilson Kenney

Interpersonal Reconstructive Therapy is a relational treatment approach designed for working with individuals with characterological dysfunction and other types of individuals who are not responsive to CBT and/or treatment as usual. It is an effective modality for engendering motivation and working through family systems factors and interpersonal/relational factors that might be impeding participation and success in treatment. Attendees will learn the basics of this theoretical approach, how to conduct interpersonal interviewing, how to identify the elements that are impeding growth, and how to work through these barriers collaboratively.

This session will provide a structure for how to begin and conduct the process of Clarification and reunification where sexual abuse has occurred. This can be a daunting process for clinical providers, but it is our hope that with the tested process that we have developed it will help ease feelings of doubt. With the knowledge gathered from doing this work with dozens of families and therapists over the years, we want to share the wisdom we have gathered. We will do a run through of the process from beginning to end highlighting both the victim therapist and the offending youths' therapist's role. We will highlight the 3-session model of clarification.

T5 The Benefits and Limitations of a Polygraph Examination *Part 1 of 2*

With sexually explicit material as readily available as a cell phone or even a watch, our kids have direct access to sexual deviance like never before. Treatment rules and probation prohibitions are just words on paper without tools for verification. If used correctly and collaboratively, polygraph can be a very strong component when assisting our youth successfully complete these programs. This session will address the benefits and limitations of the polygraph exam, implications of Fifth Amendment issues, concerns of creating deviant interests simply by exposure to the process, and the need for a multidisciplinary team approach to guide the youth to success.

Plenary: Restorative Justice and Vicarious Restorative Justice for Cases of Sexual Harm: An Interactive Plenary

Dr. Alissa Ackerman

Healing from intimate harm requires connection. Restorative justice offers that connection via unique pathways for addressing the needs expressed by those impacted by sexual harm. It offers opportunities for those who have sexually harmed others to fully own and accept responsibility for their acts while offering creative accountability measures. Restorative justice offers safe and sacred processes that are created by facilitators who are trained in active listening skills and restorative justice.

This interactive plenary will explore the roots and fundamentals of restorative justice and vicarious restorative justice for cases of sexual harm with an emphasis on vicarious restorative justice options. Participants will learn about the evidence for restorative justice, including research on outcomes of people who participate in such processes. Participants will learn about active listening skills, how to ask appropriate questions, the importance of non-verbal communication, and barriers to effective communication. We will discuss a process for taking participants through both a restorative justice and vicarious restorative justice process.

W1 Intersection of Sex Trafficking and Sexual Offending: Practical Implications for Sexual Abuse Specific Professionals

Katie Gotch

There has been an increased awareness and focus on human trafficking within the United States in recent years, with individuals convicted of sex trafficking crimes often being classified as “sexual offenders” within the criminal justice system. However, very little is known about the psychological characteristics of criminogenic risk/need factors of this offender population. This session will provide introductory training on how domestic and international human trafficking of adults and children, followed by an overview on the current research related to perpetrators of domestic sex trafficking in the United States. The session will also provide practical guidance and strategies for the assessment, treatment, and management of perpetrators of domestic sex trafficking and victims of trafficking.

W2 Effective Use of Telehealth Therapy in the Realm of Sex Offense Treatment

The health care industry has changed over the last few years with the influence of COVID and the pandemic restrictions. Many of us quickly went from in-person meetings, to conducting business, meetings, trainings and socializing online. The field of offense specific treatment was not immune to this shift. Telehealth therapy may be just a solution during the pandemic; however, as restrictions ebb-and-flow the need for Telehealth treatment services remain. Telehealth has been around for years, but can it be effective within the offense specific treatment setting. I will share my experience, knowledge, and trainings regarding the many benefits of Telehealth therapy, and I believe that Telehealth therapy is here to stay.

W3 Prolonged Stress Exposure, Staff Burnout and Self-Care

We've all heard the terms "vicarious trauma", "self-care", "burnout", and "stress", but what do we really know about these terms in practice? How do we recognize these things in our own lives and our work? Most self-care presentations focus on the low hanging fruit: exercise, diet, meditation, which can be really shaming to individuals who don't gravitate toward those activities. This presentation will provide a brief definition of these terms, what they can look like in the moment, and what to do about them to maintain our emotional and physical wellbeing and sustain a long-term career in the service field.

Alex Rodrigues, Psy.D.

Dr. Rodrigues is a forensic psychologist and operates a private consultation practice where he completes a variety of forensic evaluations, including sex offense-related evaluations, competency to stand trial, insanity, and juvenile transfer assessments. Dr. Rodrigues has been qualified as an expert and testified in various jurisdictions. The Colorado Sex Offender Management Board (CSOMB) has recognized Dr. Rodrigues as an approved provider/evaluator for both juvenile and adult populations. Additionally, he is a volunteer participant for CSOMB's best practice committee, reviewing emerging practices for adoption and implementation. He previously served as a psychologist on a pre-trial unit at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Washington, D.C. as well as a member of the hospital's forensic consultation service, completing both competency to stand trial and risk assessments. Recently, Dr. Rodrigues opened a satellite office in Colorado to complement his practice in the D.C. metropolitan area. Aside from court-related evaluations, Dr. Rodrigues provides consultation to law enforcement, government agencies, and corporations on mental health/violence related issues in the workspace.

Dr. Alissa Ackerman

Dr. Ackerman is an Associate Professor in the Division of Politics, Administration, and Justice at California State University, Fullerton and co-founder of the organization, Ampersands Restorative Justice. She has dedicated her career to studying sex crimes policy and practice, the etiology of sexual offending, the effects of sexual victimization, and, more recently, restorative justice options for those impacted by sexual harm. She is a "survivor scholar", in that she integrates her personal experience with sexual violence with her professional expertise as a sex crimes researcher. She facilitates men and women who have perpetrated acts of sexual harm using vicarious restorative justice. She has written extensively on topics related to sexual violence in blogs and magazine articles and has published over 35 peer-reviewed journal articles. She has authored or edited six books and recently serviced as co-editor on a special edition of the Journal of Sexual Abuse. Her most recent book, *Healing from Sexual Violence: The Case for Vicarious Restorative Justice*, co-authored with Dr. Jill Levenson, was published in 2019. Alissa has worked across North America, Australia, and New Zealand. She has given over fifty national and international talks on her sex crimes work including a TED Talk on *The Importance of Connection*. She co-hosts the popular podcast, *Beyond Fear: The Sex Crimes Podcast*.

Shannon Beard

I hold one bachelor's degree in Psychology and a second bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Southern Oregon University, and a Master's in Social Work from Portland State University. I've been working in the mental health and criminal justice field for over 15 years. I have spent the last 13 of those years in residential programs and Youth Correctional Facility providing inpatient offense specific treatment to young men who have sexually offended. I left facility life last July and joined a private practice where I now provide outpatient offense specific treatment to youth in three counties.

Monty Buettner

Monty Buettner holds a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice and Criminology and is a retired Detective Sergeant after 36 years of professional and ethically sound service. For 26 of those years his primary duties consisted of the investigation of sex crimes, the management of more than 100 registered sex offenders at any given time and assigned as Chairman of a Sex Offender Review Board. Since 2007 Monty has been the owner/operator of Truth Verification Services LLC and has conducted more than 1800 polygraph exams. Monty is a licensed polygraph examiner in Oregon, travels throughout the State providing exams, and has offices in Portland OR and Stevenson

Sadie Concepción

Sadie is a magna cum laude graduate of University of Oregon's Clark Honors College, where she earned her B.A. in psychology. Before entering law school, she worked for a Portland immigration attorney, later relocating to the Bay Area where she worked as a project manager at a children's services organization and as an adoption event coordinator for a regional humane society. Since arriving at Tonkon, Sadie has been an enthusiastic participant in The CLiF Project, not only by representing CLiF clients, but also developing briefs that have been used by many other CLiF lawyers.

Katie Gotch

Ms. Gotch, LPC, CCSOT, ATSA-F, has worked in the field of sexual abuse prevention for over twenty years as a clinician, evaluator, trainer, and educator, and in the development of evidence-informed public policy. She currently maintains a private practice, Integrated Clinical & Correctional Services, which provides specialized clinical and consultation services related to adults with sexual behavior problems and other forms of abusive/violent behavior.
